

CHANGES

In 1971 David Bowie wrote a song called 'Changes' in which he lamented, "Time may change me, But I can't trace time" Change is inevitable, the sun rises, the sun sets, the flowers grow and then they wither and we are all born young and die older.

We also speak of a change of heart or mind where a conscious decision is made to stop doing something or going in a certain direction and do something completely different or go in a different direction.

Our society thrives on the fear change can instil in us. Many products feed on the fear of change and the uncertainty that change instils in the minds of people. The anti-aging sector feeds on the fear of getting old. The plethora of vitamins and minerals sold today feed on the fear of getting sick and the number of self-help, positive thinking, mind over-matter gurus feed on the fear of mental instability that change can cause.

Change causes uncertainty to our lives and therefore in order to cope with it we need to have a sure foundation to stand upon in the midst of change.

Malachi 3:6 "I the LORD do not change..."

James 1:17 Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows.

In the midst of change which is inevitable, whether it be because we choose to make a change or because it is thrust upon us by an unforeseen circumstance, it's important to know that God never changes and that He is always wanting to bless us and give us whatever we need to cope with change and the uncertainty that change can cause.

The Wednesday night bible study group have been studying John's gospel account. If ever there was a group of men and women who needed to cope with change it was the followers of Jesus.

When Jesus' ministry began, everything He said and did was in stark contrast to the norms and traditions of that time. If Jesus' followers were going to dedicate their lives to following Him then they had to accept that their lives had to change. He ate with sinners. (Mark 2:16) He healed on the Sabbath. (Luke 13:14) He questioned long held traditions like abstaining from certain foods. (Mark 7:9)

He made the boundaries of forgiveness wider than the accepted traditions. (Luke 6:27 & Matthew 18:21-22)

The disciples were forced to face the prospect of change every day but their willingness to accept change was ultimately tested on the night before Jesus was arrested.

The first change Jesus confronted His disciples with was that *He* would serve *them* in order to teach them how to serve one another and ultimately other people. He conveyed this profound lesson in the simple act of washing His disciples' feet. When Jesus came to the feet of Peter he baulked, "No, you shall never wash my feet." (John 13:8)

Peter couldn't accept the change of roles this confronting act presented to him, but Jesus told him that he needed to change his mind if he wanted to receive the blessing Jesus was graciously giving him by performing this menial task.

Later Jesus told His disciples that He would be leaving them to go to somewhere that they couldn't follow Him to, at that time. This naturally troubled the disciples. They had been faithfully following Jesus, listening to Him and learning from Him, so why should things have to change?

Jesus went on to declare that He was going away for their benefit but all this talk of going away, even if it ultimately led the disciples to a greater understanding of who Jesus was and who His Father was, was too much for Philip and he told Jesus,

"Lord, show us the Father and that will be enough for us." (John 14:8)

Philip verbally requested what was on the minds of all the disciples which was basically, "Why do things have to change?" It seems as if Philip's request to Jesus hurt Him for He responded,

"Don't you know me, Philip, even after I have been among you for such a long time?" (John 14:9) He then declared to Philip that anyone who had seen Him has seen the Father.

With these words, Jesus allayed the fear of the disciples. The change they were afraid of wasn't really a change at all. All it would be was a greater revelation of the reality they had been living in.

Changes Continued

But, Jesus went on to tell His disciples that without His *physical* presence in their lives some things would change and they would need to remain in the *spiritual* presence of Jesus and the Father in order to face the trials that would come their way. (John 15:1-17)

The main change that the disciples needed to prepare for was that they would be hated by the world, "... If they persecuted me, they will persecute you also ..." (John 15:20)

Without Jesus' physical presence, the anger the world feels towards God would become concentrated on the disciples and they needed to be ready for that change.

Jesus then declared they wouldn't face this harsh change on their own. They would be strengthened and encouraged by the Holy Spirit in their lives,

"But when he, the Spirit of truth, comes, he will guide you into all the truth." (John 16:13)

So, what can we learn from all of this to help us in our moments of change?

Firstly, and most importantly, when change comes, make sure you are standing firmly in the knowledge that God doesn't change. He is the same God yesterday, today and tomorrow.

Secondly, God never leaves us to cope with change with just our own resources but He richly blesses us with everything we need to cope with change.

Thirdly, humbly allow Jesus to serve you in the midst of change so that you can receive all the resources you need to not only cope with change but also give to others as they cope with their changes.

Fourthly, God alone knows the benefits of the changes that will occur in our lives and those benefits will be greater than we will ever imagine and can allay any fear that may try to overcome us when faced with change.

Finally, when change comes we don't face the trials that change can bring on our own for Jesus promised that He will send us the Holy Spirit to comfort and guide us so we can boldly step out into change knowing we don't go alone.



The small gas burner, steadied by pieces of wood, stood outside in the dingy alley. One of many alleyways that ran like rat warrens throughout this city area. Hundreds of one room dwellings opened their doors onto these alleys. A few privileged residents, cooking for tourist groups, earned extra money. The pungent aroma of rotting vegetables, stagnant water and crowded humanity affronted the nostrils. Temporarily, the aromatic smell of the meal cooking, overshadowed the stench. While Ling huddled over her outdoor gas cooker we sat talking to our guide. There were few ornaments in this room. A two cupboard kitchen bench, a small shower/laundry cubicle, a bed, a table and three shelves were crammed into this single room. The wooden floor was achingly worn and stained by many years of foot traffic. A single bed frame supported a sagging mattress and two thin blankets. A bare light bulb hung in the centre of the room.

The meal was testimony to the cooking skills of Ling. Chicken dumplings, stir fried vegetables and fried rice were spiced to perfection. We talked while we ate. Ling told us about her late husband, experiences of her early life and something of her life now. We told her about Australia and why we had found ourselves travelling in China. Our guide was kept busy interpreting the flow of conversation. Ling talked about her husband, his life in the navy and the pride in the uniform. From her conversation it was obvious she loved him.

When Ling brought the photo of her husband from the shelf it exposed the small object I had seen earlier. "I like that" Gary pointed as he saw the object too. Ling smiled and took the well-worn little cross lovingly off the shelf. "My husband and I have been Christians for many years. This cross reminds me of my husband and the faith we share," Ling mused. Ling's face lit up in wonder, tears glistened in her eyes, when we told her we too were Christians.

The three of us prayed together and hugged each other. We acknowledged that while we would not meet again on this earth, we would know each other in heaven. Our guide was amazed at the connection our shared faith had produced. Was it a coincidence that led us to that particular alley to be fed by that particular lady? Circumstances are not just chance. God works in mysterious ways. The three of us felt blessed and thankful that we had met.

REPAIR WITH PRAYER

Repairs come in lots of forms. Some of you will remember clothes being patched and socks being darned. My widowed maternal grandmother would spend some weeks with us mending and darning farm clothing.

What repair nightmare story might you hear from a panel beater, a medical practitioner or someone going through a relationship breakdown? Repair conjures up words like fix, mend, overhaul, remedy, connect and more; If we break down the word repair, we see the word 'pair.' So repair is pairing parts that have somehow come apart. The 're' part of repair then is regarding the need to be put back together. For a vehicle it may involve a whole new panel or panels. For a person seeing a doctor its medication or surgery, or the worst case scenario; sorry, there's nothing more we can do! Dysfunction and relationship breakdowns hit hardest as so many others are caught up in the ripple effect.

All this and more involves repair or restoration in some form or another. As a denomination, the LCANZ, is in a season of prayer. This is prayer at all levels; personal, small group and corporate prayer. Mostly we've become too dependent on the pastor to pray. Our prayers in whatever form call on God the repairer of souls. The church is sick, if we're honest, because we have neglected serious, corporate, ongoing prayer for too long. It's too easy to look at our own resources instead of going to God who has all the resources we need. (there's another re word) So many people are broken and in need. Am I the only one who thinks we have lost the joy of our relationship with Jesus as we wrangle over who can be ordained in the LCANZ and other divisive issues? Jesus calls us to unity in him. If we are really in a heart to heart relationship with Jesus why is it so challenging to share Jesus love with others? Our greatest need is to be connected (paired with) God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It's our collective mission to reach out to people for Jesus. This then requires much prayer as an ongoing, self-sacrificial calling on the repair resources of the Almighty One.

In Matthew 7: 7-8 Jesus invites us to ask, seek and knock at the door of God's storehouse of plentiful blessings to help repair with prayer. Let's be realistic about the time and place in which we live; so many broken hearts and shattered lives desperately need pairing with the God who loves everyone and wants a grace-filled, joyful, relationship with them. Relationship breakdown has to be the ultimate reason for us as Jesus' followers to pray and go in Jesus' name.

Let's pray...

Father God, we come before you in great need. You have everything we need. Help us trust you as we ask, seek and knock for all we need to see a real difference in our own lives and to make a difference in the lives of others and in our denomination. Make us diligent in prayer as individuals, as groups and corporately. Send us from our congregation to the communities where we live. Turn our despondency to joy, our fear to faith and our prayer to praise for your faithfulness and love in Jesus, in whose name we pray. Amen. Joy Christian

COME TO THE BANQUET EXHIBITION

In August 2023, St Mark's played host for the LCA annual Simultaneous Art Exhibition. With the support of the Evangelism and Welfare committee, Annette Cavies and Jenny Curtis took on the role of planning, and decided it might be a good opportunity to incorporate the Lutheran Churches of the Adelaide Hills as a combined effort. Jan Kaesler from St Michaels, Hahndorf then joined our small team and we started advertising for artists to participate. Schools, Retirement centres and Churches were all asked, eventuating in enough interest to deem it possible to proceed.

In the meantime, St Mark's Ladies group MnM's had planned an event in August to learn the art of Mosaic. As Annette was going to be leading this event, a quick bit of thought and rescheduling opened up an opportunity for MnM's to work together on a combined piece as a contribution to the Exhibition.

With the theme 'Come to the Banquet', Annette visualised a mosaiced vessel flowing to a banquet table and asked the ladies to start collecting old crockery that was no longer wanted and able to be broken. To add a 'Royal' look to the table, the colour theme was to be of Golds and yellows. This created a bit of fun for them all to search for such an item. Some pieces seemed too precious to break – but once the hammering started there was no going back. Work began in June and continued over the next two months with ladies returning several times to continue the cutting and sticking. The design of the table evolved over the period until the table was covered. The piece was then grouted and cleaned for presentation. The group is to be commended for their persistence to the project and can be very proud of the achievement.

A name "Banquet for Broken Vessels" was chosen for the Art piece.

This created quite a conversation for some. To mirror this, a shadow figure of Jesus was also made and shown on entry to the hall, welcoming the visitors.

The setup of the final exhibition exceeded expectations. The hall was filled and presented a very good and very interesting display of a very wide variety of art pieces in many media. Credit is given to the ladies for the work they put in and the way the event was structured. St Marks school groups came through, students brought their families, a strong following of contributing artists brought through a few visitors and several others came from other churches. St Marks members got their own opportunity to view it after a church service on the Sunday. A highlight for the committee was a special event held on Friday night where the key contributors were invited to come together and enjoy wine and nibbles, while Sam and Steph Curtis and David Heyne kindly played some background music through the venue. A special thankyou to them, to everyone who donated food for the event and others for their support. Money was also raised – mainly covering the costs, but a donation was made to ALWS on behalf of the event.

This event is held annually by the LCA. Keep your eye out for it in oncoming years. St Marks won't always participate but we certainly learnt a lot about the event and can use our knowledge for ongoing opportunities. Practice up those art skills!!





CONVERSATION CAN LEAD TO CONNECTION

At mainly music each Monday, our morning is made up of music, eat, chat and play.

I marvel each week how easily the chat happens. Even when we have new families start, the atmosphere is such that all are welcomed and connections start forming. I'm guessing the common link is the children. There's always something to talk about with children around.

What is conversation? A talk, especially an informal one, between two or more people, in which ideas and news are exchanged. Questions are asked and can be answered.

What is connection? Human connection is the sense of closeness and belongingness a person can experience when having supportive relationships with those around them.

This is such an important thing that we as mainly music leaders aim for each week. We aim to interact with those we see each week so that each person feels valued, seen and heard.

I'm thinking that's what all of us as Christians would be wanting with anyone we come in contact with.

As our numbers grow at mainly music, it is a concern that we do see and hear each mum, dad and grandparent that comes through our door. That's why it's so important that we have suitable numbers in our team. We would be so disappointed if someone went home feeling uncared for.

Last week I was thinking that I didn't speak to a particular mum but was encouraged to see one of the other leaders engaging in conversation with her.

Thinking more on this I thought how I didn't get to speak to her but I did

- * talk to a mum about a new treatment for hay fever I was trying. She was away from mm last week with hay fever.
- * talk to a mum about a Christian discipline method I've observed to be effective
- * get to compare an apple slice recipe that the kitchen helper had made for morning tea that day
- * talk to a mum about how her child is struggling to separate from her since a new bubs has been born.

There must be so many conversations all our leaders are having each week. I asked some others to share what they talked about that day too.

- *a mum shared her struggle with being away from her daughter when she had her first anaphylactic reaction to peanuts
- * another mum shared about her experiences as a newly qualified teacher in the APY lands and how that shaped who she is and how she teaches.

He spent time with people.

In a recently published book I read: "It is a remarkable fact of history that the Protestant missionary movement – was born during a Lutheran Communion service in the backwaters of Germany. Count Zinzendorf and the Moravians had no idea at the time, but their "Baptism of love" was just the first stirrings of a movement so explosive that it would alter the trajectory of both England and America forever." This led to a prayer revival that continued for 100 years, and out of it thousands of missionaries were send to the ends of the earth, including Bethel, near Kapunda. Sometimes we just need that time to say HELLO and the conversation and connection begins. Hello is a small word, but it says to someone 'I see you'.

Like the wind, we do not know where the Spirit might blow on our ordinary days (John 3:8) ---- and that is exciting. Could it be that our conversations have meant that the Spirit is already at work in the lives of the people we have met at mm?

We rely on prayer at the beginning of our morning at mainly music. Prayer is that special conversation with God that builds connection. How honoured our team of leaders feel that we can turn to God for all our needs during the session.

He is in turn allowing this ministry to grow. We love each family that comes and we have formed connection with them.

But it is in our praying that we long for them to find connection to God.

For *hello* to pass over our vocal cords, it requires only a mustard seed of faith in our great God. This is true too for those simple everyday conversations to go deeper. Bold we must be to bring Jesus into our conversations.

In addition to our faithful prayers that God would open a door for His word, the gospel, we need to ask Him to give us everything we need to have those conversations and to be a blessing to anyone He puts in our path. God's invitation is for us to live with Him. CONNECTED. And we want others to have that too.

As humans, God created us to build connections through healthy communication and shared experiences. This is what we try to do at mm.

So, it makes sense that we would build a relationship with Him in the same way.

No relationship grows if we only repeat the same conversation from the last time and the time before that. God wants to hang out with us.
